Are You in the Zoning Board's Crosshairs?

The Zoning Board wants you to spend a lot of money so that your place looks like a house in the suburbs. They want to deny you the right to have a shack in the woods.

Why? It drives down property values. It drives down tax valuations.

Shouldn't we have the right to live off-grid? Why do we have to live in a house with sheetrock and running water, if we don't want to?

Why should anyone have to spend \$30k so that you can have a driveway that looks like a palatial entrance? Why do you need a highway approach when you live on a gravel road where the speed limit is 35 mph?

(Some people don't want you to find their driveway anyway. There is such a thing as privacy).

They call it "growth" but what the current zoning and planning board wants is to replace the pioneers of Benewah County with wealthy vacationers. They want the County to be the place of "the second home," a satellite economy to the urban hub of Spokane and CDA.

The Governor's Head Fake

As I have been reporting on the implementation of the Governor's Executive Order No. 2022-04 for "All Hazards Prevention," you need to pay attention to the wording. It is not emergency *response* preparedness they are talking about. I do not think anyone has a quarrel with that course of action.

He added the words "prevention" and "mitigation" to the order. The difference is the difference between freedom and tyranny.

Per the customs of "command and control" of the Left Coast, Idaho's agencies are now tasked with evaluating normal living patterns of citizens and deciding which practices are "safe" or "hazardous." A cornucopia of control over your life has just been opened in Idaho. Get ready for an infestation of bureaucratic rodents.

Remember, this was a **declaration of an emergency** and the power was put in the hands of the Idaho Office of Emergency Management (OEM) which is a part of the military division of the Governor's Office. It is run by the Governor's Adjutant General. He has been tasked with the *military* enforcement of this emergency decree. We have a name for that: it's called "martial law."

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<u>Is Benewah County Under a "State of Emergency"?</u>

Yes, and the Zoning Board has been tasked with preparing an "Emergency Response Plan" by the end of 2025. But it does not stop there. The County Commission has endowed the Zoning Board Chairman with administrative powers: that means enforcement powers. When finished, he will then have the "all hazards prevention and mitigation" powers described above.
