Like the smaller fish eaten by the bigger one and with the ink not yet dry on the recent water adjudication agreement, we learn that the Coeur d'Alene Tribe has partnered with the Peregrine Project in the Treasure Valley to build a multi-billion dollar industrial park which will include a casino, an Artificial Intelligence Data Center and a 10,000 unit housing project to essentially build a new "smart" city east of Boise. We now know why farmers and ranchers downstream on the Snake River are finding themselves cut off from their usual access to water.

How this could have happened when the "agreement" itself declared there were no "side-deals" in the works as "consideration," belies the disingenuous nature of the entire document. "Data centers" are not made like a 3-minute burger.

The Agreement allows the Tribe to invest in off-reservation projects; so this must have been planned long ago.

[Again, our County Commissioners remain silent on the matter, as if Water Adjudication never happened.]

Where the Tribe will get the money to "pay-to-play" with these world-class oligarch grifters ought to raise some suspicion. The

Tribe brags about its "investments" which are self-funded with no debt, while Tribal communities, like Plummer, languish from unpaved streets and a decaying infrastructure.

Are they counting on Congress? Or are they relying upon a financial hypothecation of their newly acquired captured market: priority water rights to the CDA/Spokane River basin?

For those of you who thought that it was ok to submit in *liege* to the Tribe just so you can wiggle your toes in the St. Joe River, remember, *you* are the captured market who will pay for these boondoggles.

What Does Water Adjudication Mean to You?

You will continue to hear glowing reports how water adjudication will bring more money to the Tribe and that they will be able to do "so much more" for our local communities.

Off-reservation state citizens - many of whom participated in the adjudication process with a list that reads like a "Who's Who" of local power players - will be satisfied that "I got mine," never mind the rest of you "suckers."

And "suckers" you are, especially "Allottees" (Tribal private property owners) and state citizens whose

properties lie within the Reservation boundaries. You have just been thrown under the bus.

A new layer of bureaucracy run by the Leftist crazies that inhabit Tribal and state agencies will now be in charge of your water rights, and by extension (something that is never mentioned) land use in general.

When these bureaucrats are tasked with the fund-raising needs of the Tribe, expect new and unheard of fees and rules that will make your life miserable.

Push Back

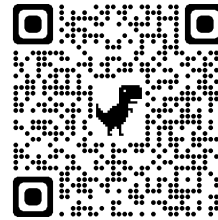
The 4th of July is just around the corner. Take the time this year to actually read the Declaration of Independence. It is not too difficult and it is actually very inspirational.
